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## USING THIS GUIDE

This guide outlines a path for degree completion at Webster University for the Bachelor of Arts in Management for students entering with an Associate of Arts degree in General Transfer Studies from St. Louis Community College. This should not be used in place of individual academic advising. Students are strongly encouraged to meet with a Webster University transfer admissions counselor early in their academic career to ensure a smooth transfer experience.

The primary objective in creating this transfer program is to provide the opportunity for prospective students to combine STLCC's excellent foundational General Transfer Studies program with a high quality liberal arts and Management specific program available from Webster University in St. Louis, Missouri. Potential graduates of this program will be provided a well-balanced, in-depth Management education, capitalizing on the best aspects of teaching and learning performed by each institution.

## ABOUT THE MANAGEMENT MAJOR AT WEBSTER

Management is the art and science of effectively coordinating people and resources to achieve the goals of an organization. It includes the administration of commerce and industry, banking, insurance, health, communications, government, and various facets of culture, education, and the arts. Students study principles and institutions through accounting, management, and economics, as well as the humanities, mathematics, and political and social sciences. The Department of Management prepares students for graduate studies, law school, and business careers. The Department of Management at Webster University has been designed to meet the needs of younger students as well as mature adults who have had business and professional experiences before completing their academic careers.

The BA in Management is available on-ground (Webster Groves home campus, Gateway campus, Westport campus, Winghaven campus) and online.

## WEBSTER ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

When considering an application, Webster looks for evidence of potential for academic success. A cumulative GPA on college level coursework of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale is preferred; however, each applicant is given individual consideration. If you have circumstances which might affect admission this may be discussed confidentially with a member of the admissions staff. The University operates on rolling admission, and application files are reviewed by an admissions counselor as soon as all requested credentials have been received.

Each transfer applicant must submit:

- f A Completed Application for Admission
- f A \$35.00 nonrefundable application fee
- f An official transcript from St. Louis Community College, and an official transcript from any and all other postsecondary institutions previously attended.

## IMPORTANT TRANSFER NOTES

- f Webster has a minimum residency requirement that 60% of the student's last 36 credits must be taken at Webster University. All students must have a minimum of 128 credit hours to graduate.

- f* A minimum of 18 credit hours of the required 39 credit hours of major academic work must be taken at Webster University in the George Herbert Walker School of Business & Technology.
  - f* Courses completed with a grade below a C do not count toward fulfilling the specific course requirements of the major or general education/Global Citizenship Program.

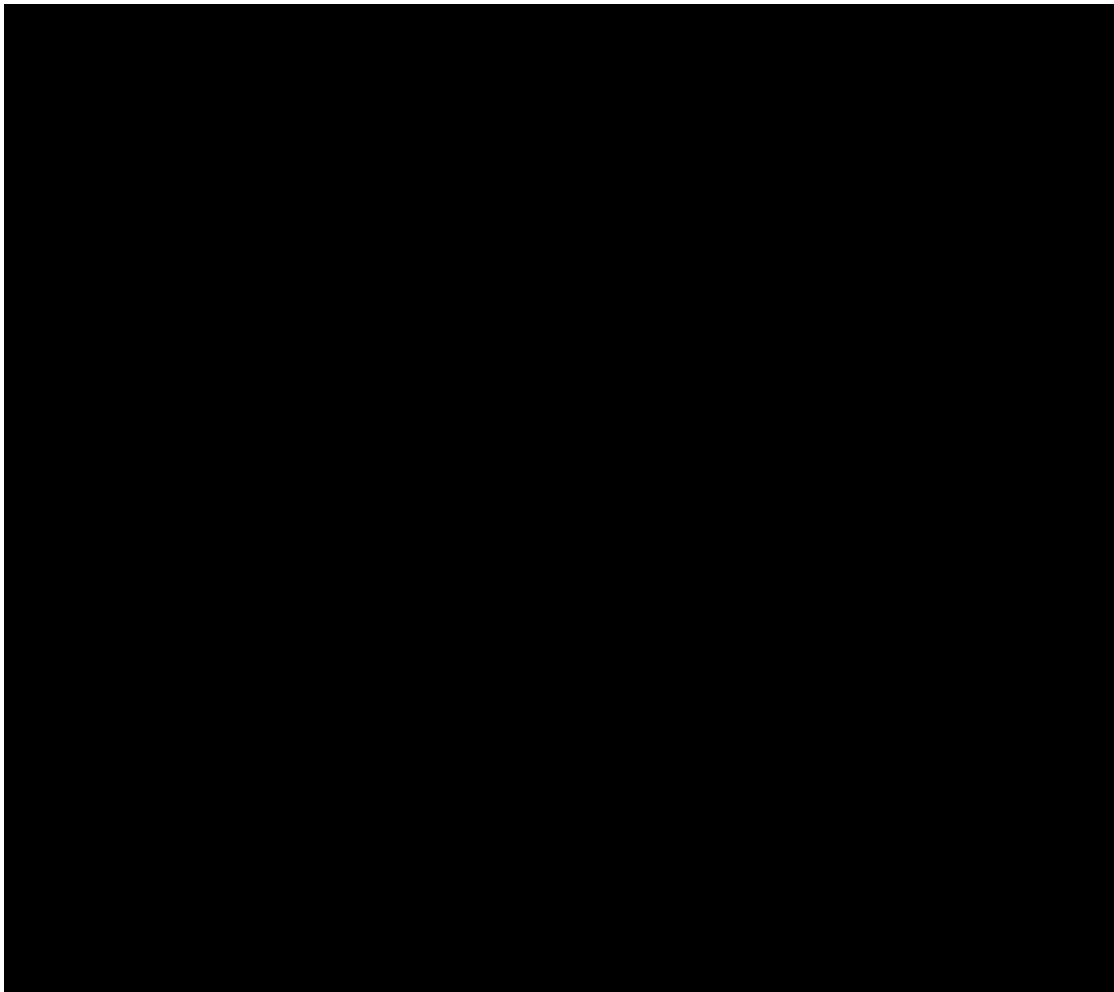
